Reflection for 4th Sunday of Lent from the Pastor, Fr. Emmanuel

"The Lord is my shepherd, there is nothing I shall want."

This past week has been filled with so many things. I have read many medical research materials from health professionals, watched some chilling documentaries from Italian hospitals, listened to series of press briefings, read lots of statements from the bishops, celebrated Masses solo and watched many of my brother priests celebrate Masses without a congregation. I find myself wondering: what is possibly next?

No one would have ever imagined that we will live in a world where we cannot gather together to celebrate the Holy Eucharist. Who would have thought we would experience a halted economy or a global travel restriction? No one would have thought items would be rationed at grocery stores. Needless to say, many are scared for what the future brings. Parents are overwhelmed trying to navigate family life. Some are worried about their jobs and how the bills will get paid. We may be tempted to see doom, pain, fear, despair, confusion and questions.
